Subject Area: World Languages
Course Name: Latin III Prose-History

Summary: Latin III students receive Honors Credit with a weighted grade. They are expected to perform at a higher level than the Latin II students. This course has been structured around the Chronology of Roman History, from the Trojan War up to and through the reign of Emperors. Students will read selections from a wide variety of authors writing about different points of Roman History and the people living during that time. Great emphasis will be spent on the first centuries BC and AD and the people who had political and social impact on the city during those years. Students are expected to translate original Latin works into English and to analyze, interpret and explain all English readings in a historical context. Students who choose may enroll in the High School Plus Program with Camden County College. These students will receive three college credits for a final grade of "B" or better.
